School Library

Supported by a new team of Librarians, appointed after application by the School Parliament, Sue Pellow has carried out a review of all the books we have in school, to raise the quality and efficiency of the library. A school project is to review the space available for an appropriate bespoke library space and to improve the number and range of reading materials. We are eager to see the library resource used to its full potential so have redistributed class books – children from every class are choosing favourites for their classroom this week. These will be changed and rotated throughout coming terms, but essentially there will be a bigger pool available centrally. We've ideas for the future too, to help children make use of the library with their families. However, before we are ready for that, we do have to address the cuurent overall shortage of books – our allocation is around the 6 books for every child ratio and education guidance indicates that it should be more than twice that (at around 12-13 books per pupil). On top of increasing our stock, we also need to upgrade the physical environment and for that we need your help with....

Fund Raising

We've a couple of ideas for a focussed effort to meet the financial demands for our library improvements next term. The first is a table-top book sale in the hall where we raise the profile of our aims for the library and the second is to dedicate a Sponsored Swanpool Cycle to create a library improvement fund. Funds raised will work alongside the budget allocation and a support grant for which we have applied to place this key area very visibly at the heart of the school. Support for your family – Pupil Premium; Free School Meals; Universal Credit

With the roll out of the Universal Credit other benefits currently used to calculate Free School Meal entitlement will be withdrawn As a result, the rules will change between now and 2022. I've copied the government's pdf Bulletin below: Universal Credit

The heart of the issue is that as Universal Credit is rolled out, the existing criteria for free school meals will no longer exist.

Under the current rules, covering a variety of benefits, in order to receive free school meals, households must work fewer than a set number of hours as well as taking home income under a certain threshold.

As more people move on to receiving universal credit, the rules on eligibility will need updating, so the Government is proposing a single, simple test: that households must earn less than a household income threshold before any benefits are received. Under the new scheme, 50,000 more children will actually receive free school meals than at the moment.

The proposals will mean:

- 1. If a child receives a free school meal now they will continue to do so until the end of the rollout of Universal Credit, planned for 2022, and then to the end of ether primary or secondary school (which ever the child is in at this point).
- If a child receives a free school meal during the roll out of Universal Credit they will continue to do so until the end of roll out of Universal Credit, planned for 2022, and then to the end of either primary or secondary school (which ever the child is in at this point).

These protection arrangements will enable hundreds of thousands of children to continue to receive a meal during the roll-out, even if family earnings exceed the threshold.

The £7,400 threshold relates to earned income, and it does not include additional incomings through universal credit. Depending on their exact circumstances, a typical family earning around our threshold would have a total annual household income of between £18,000 and £24,000.

The government are committed to ensuring that disadvantaged, young people are able to access a free nutritious meal at school and this extension will increase the number of disadvantaged children who are eligible for this.

Discussions have been had with many of you about the difficulties schools face when trying to ensure every eligible family claims free school meals (entitling the school to Pupil Premium). This has been discussed this with the Minister responsible to see if a mechanism can be implemented to enable automatic registration for free school meals/pupil premium. Currently this is not possible due to data-protection concerns and the Minister is exploring how these concerns can be overcome.

The government view is that these changes will have a positive impact on schools' access to Pupil Premium funding. That waits to be seen. It is clear at this moment that budgets are being drawn ever tighter and pupil premium is extremely important to us in helping to meet specific support needs for children at the school. As infants are entitled to free meals anyway there is a possibility that not everyone who is entitled has applied. If you are in receipt of Income Support, Income Based Job Seekers allowance (not contribution based), Income related Employment and Support Allowance (not contribution based) or Child tax Credit with an annual income of less than £16,190 and have not yet applied for free school meals, please let the office know or speak to me as you may be entitled to funding that can assist your child at school. All information will be managed with the utmost confidence. Thank you.
