Dear Parents

On Friday we said goodbye to our y6 children leaving for secondary school. Those moving on to Falmouth will be spending their first week there from today, with specially designed activities to introduce them to their new forms and teachers, and to get to know their way around the buildings. Pupils from all the Falmouth primary schools who are going to other secondary settings are also taking part in some transfer activities and will spend some time with their new classmates. Our best wishes go with every member of a class of which we are particularly proud. It will feel very strange here without them, especially as for our final week they will literally leave a hole at Marlborough!

This Friday's school family gathering at Swanpool should be a very special occasion as I hope the y6 will return, tell us all about their first week of moving up, and enjoy a very fond farewell from the whole Marlborough community. The evening usually gets started around 17:30 and with sunset at 21:18 and the tide dropping until 22:07 all we need to hope for is good weather!

This marks the end of one of the busiest but most successful years I remember at Marlborough. Parents will recall the challenges I felt lay before us in early newsletters and explained at the infant and junior meetings last September. With your support, the staff and children have worked with resilient energy and sustained enthusiasm through the whole of the 2016-2017 school year, turning those challenges into opportunities. We can now celebrate some significant achievements:

Mega Maths – the regular morning maths have been a big success, starting the day with enjoyable activities and challenges to sharpen children's skills and fluency. Help us to keep children's counting and multiplication strong.

Wonderful Wednesdays – have moved from Fab Friday mornings to a dedicated afternoon slot, so that we can ensure some continued cross age learning and target developmental activities to address a wide range of skills, from science investigations and computer e-Safety to cooking and drawing.

School Grounds Developments – it's taken its time, but the rejuvenated infant garden area will be ready for the new term, mirroring the work carried out on the Junior Jungle Run... and the improvements will continue...

Tescos Bags of Help Grant – not only Marlborough families helped us to win the local appeal, but people across West Cornwall clearly recognised our aim to inspire children's learning outside the classroom. Thank you too for keeping the outdoor learning funds ticking by supporting donations to and purchases of the monthly cake-bakes.

LA Leadership and Management Review – The local authority visited to carry out an inspection of the school in the February. Their report is confidential but recognised the achievement of the whole school team and the strength of the new Senior Leadership staff in particular (Lisa Pearce, George Harry-Poole and Kathy Rowe).

School Food Award - the work of the kitchen and in class was recognised with Cornwall's School Food Award.

PADL Award – the school Parliament has grown up significantly in the pats two years and went straight through bronze to win the county's Silver Award for school democracy – we've already targeted gold for next year!

Healthy Schools – the assessment process has changed this year and Marlborough was among the first schools to be recognised by the heads of Cornwall's Health and Education as meeting the new Healthy Schools Standard.

Arts Awards – well done to Louise Gall and Sue Pellow for helping this year's fantastic y6 artists win this recognition.

Sports – full involvement locally with some great achievements and improved performances among all school teams.

Residential Visits – y6's visit to Paris and y4's journey west to Carnyorth were both a great success, due mainly to the attitude and behaviour of the children. Adults who accompanied both classes thoroughly enjoyed the trips.

Assessments – we are very <u>proud</u> of <u>all</u> the children's learning achievements this year – more details in the autumn!

And thank you to everyone who made such an effort with and for your children to celebrate the day with some amazing costume ideas. Lunchtime Arrangements

This week we welcome next year's new reception class and parents to a taster session meal at early sittings on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. It has of course been a relief to know that the government is honouring its commitment to the universal free school meals for infants – to have lost this funding part way through implementing the policy would have been very damaging. At Marlborough we will continue to develop the service to make the whole lunchtime experience as healthy and as enjoyable as we can. We are hopeful that most children moving up to the juniors will continue to opt for healthy school meals, but will also cater for those who bring in a packed lunch from home alongside their friends.

Last week, the school Parliament voted in favour of a proposal to streamline the junior service through two alternating sittings which should enable them to sit with friends of their choice for every meal and also, alongside other changes to supervision outdoors. This takes into account the new grounds facilities and access to the field and the need to ensure a full range of quiet and more active play areas. The playgrounds will be properly organised according to the activities available in each – we will provide a wide range of equipment, particularly different balls, so children do not need to bring play equipment from home. We are trialling these arrangements this week but full details of the different play zones will be explained next term.

Indoors, there will be the opportunity once again for children to enjoy lunch together whether they are having a school meal or sandwiches from home. This does lead to the need for some greater consistency in meals from home meeting the national school food standards. We have seen a significant, and to be frank, quite shocking increase in the number of sweets and confectionary being brought in packed lunch boxes over the past year. This term some children brought in *Snickers* bars (other brands are available but not desirable in school)! For specific personal health and safety reasons, Marlborough is a nut free school. One of the first tasks of the school parliament Food Committee will be to draw up the children's ideas for a School Packed Lunch code in accordance with our food policy. Beginning this week, because children with different meal formats will be sharing tables, those with packed lunch will need to transfer their meal to a plate for hygiene and health reasons, and also to encourage good tables manners.
