Parents' Survey

Thank you to everyone who completed the on-line parents' survey. With an enthusiastic rush at the end, the final response was a very good one, and I know that there were still a few people who were sorry to just miss the deadline.

This service came as a part of the assessment package we are using this year and should be available again for the future. Even without any previous data for comparison, it has already provided us with some useful information, and raised some questions too. We will be following these up as 'lines of enquiry' but in the meantime, thought you might like to know the main findings:

- 83 completed questionnaires were returned representing a response rate of 38.2% of all parents
- Parents gave an excellent score (86.5%) for the school's overall performance
- Of the parents whose children were not in their first year at the school 33% said the school had improved over the last year and 10% thought that the school's performance was worse
- Of the parents of new pupils, 32% said the school was better than they had expected it to be while 8% felt that it had not lived up to their expectations
- Parents are most happy with community spirit, teaching quality and computer access
- They are least happy with class sizes, library facilities and school communication
- The criteria most important for parents are children's happiness, developing confidence and potential and the quality of teaching
- Their least important criteria are library facilities, computer access and the use of exams and testing

The report is an extremely comprehensive one – running to 62 pages, and that's without including the individual comments, which have yet to be collated! With opinions on performance and priorities both being requested it is also a fairly complicated process to evaluate. For example, ideally those criteria which are most important to parents would also be the ones to which parents they award the highest scores. Conversely, it might not be so critical if areas which are not so highly valued, don't score so strongly under performance.

However, at Marlborough we are eager to do as well as we can for you and your children in every area of our service. It is pleasing that of all the 'gradings' provided (where, as with the Ofsted system, 1 = outstanding, 2 = good, 3 = requires improvement and 4 = inadequate) parents rated the school as 2 (good) in its Leadership and Management and 1 (outstanding) in the areas relating to the Quality of Teaching; Early Years; Personal Development, Behaviour and Welfare; and Outcomes for Pupils.

There were also some very fair and pertinent observations, and the survey identified areas for improvement as being the use of teachers' feedback on pupils' work; e-safety; and the appropriate level of challenge. If you would like to pass on any views on ways that we can improve these areas, and also with school communication please do leave a comment in the post-box beside the office door.
