## Dear Parents,

This is something like the 570<sup>th</sup> newsletter I've written as headteacher at Marlborough School and quite apart from it being a strange experience to find it's my last, it is also the hardest to write. It is difficult to find the words to do justice to the sense of honour I have felt as head in this unique school, serving such a special community other than, quite simply, **good bye** and **thank you**! Whatever the challenges and occasional trials of being a headteacher throughout a period that has seen such enormous changes – I arrived for my first headship in 1997 on the same day that the school received its first computer and had to wait another 2 years before I was given a school email address! (I'm not sorry to be letting that go) – the memories I will take away are all happy ones).

And I think for most, if not all of us, Marlborough is a place of happiness and hope. Whilst as parents and teachers we cannot promise that everything will always go well and that growing up will be without pain, we can do all we are able to equip children with the resilience to overcome difficulties and the resourcefulness to meet all challenges positively. I am proud to have been able to work alongside a team of dedicated and creative teachers and support staff. Their daily commitment ensures the best possible learning environment – teachers' willingness to take risks is the best role model for learners and I trust that we will always hold on to the principle that the primary classroom, especially those at Marlborough, should be the safest place in the world to make mistakes.

This has meant that we put our head above the parapet and at times, in the current educational climate, can take a few hits. Thank you for your many kind words and support through last year's Ofsted and in recent weeks for me personally. Thank you especially for holding faith with all that matters most about our school – strong relationships built on respect (with Marlborough Manners key) and an active excitement for learning. These ensure that children moving on from the school are extremely well equipped to face the next steps in their learning journey and I have gained the greatest 'job satisfaction' from the consistent reports from secondary schools that Marlborough pupils can always be recognised for their independence and personal responsibility. That they go with good all round curriculum skills is also of huge importance and our strong position in the Cornwall schools 'league tables' is one of the best answers we can give the inspection regime. The other is that the school is and will continue to address all improvement recommendations with deepset commitment. Positive learning experiences, enthusiasm and a wider understanding of how they learn through the six R Learning Powers remain constant for children and, in looking to appoint a new headteacher, the governors have a clear idea of the school philosophy they aim to continue to grow into the future.

The governors have asked that the school's 'Mission Statement' included as part of the headteacher applicants' information package is shared with you. I had no part in putting this together, but it does accord with so much of what I believe and I feel very honoured that the principles that have driven my career are so valued by the governing body. The team of people who have voluntarily put themselves forward to secure the best for the children at this school are very well equipped to take Marlborough forward. I owe them an enormous dept for the time and support they have given me over the years. The manner in which they have risen to the past few moths challenge has been extraordinary and I feel strongly that the school is in good shape and good hands for the future.

I will, of course, miss you all and the children more than I yet realise but to be allowed to be part of their memories is the enduring sense of worth I shall take into my own future.

Marlborough continually strives for outstanding leadership, teaching and governance to create a supportive learning environment where we meet the highest standards in education while fuelling the spark of natural curiosity that is in every child.
